Saleem can also be seen as the conscious self of Salman Rushdie himself because many of the things have been presented to us from the perspective of his own. There are so many similarities between these two selves. However, major discussion here is the nation and how both of them have discussed it and presented it throughout the novel. We can also find that the concept of Mother India has been included in the novel by the novelist. This is a kind of meat that has come into existence at the time of the Indian movement of independence. Salman Rushdie has made a full use of this in order to present his characters as well as the nation. Saleem scenery has become the national son and his mother Amina Sinai has been taken as the National mother. She is the real metaphor taken for India. She has readily saved a child when the Hindu Revivalist group has attacked and terrorizes Lafifa Das. With bravery and boldness, she announces,

"Listen well, I am with the child. I am a mother who will have a child and I am giving this man my shelter. Come on now, if you want to kill, kill a mother also and show the world what men you are!" (86)

The use of the myth called 'Mother India' as a nation has really been operated on two diverse levels throughout the novel. Firstly, we can see that the whole Nation or the wholeness of the nation has been changed to that of the fragmentation where it has been divided into so many parts. Secondly, we can say the joining of the fragments to a college whole. Both these changes have been worked upon by Rushdie verywell throughout the novel which makes this novel a beautiful piece of art. Rushdie has shown that the above two independent India has been split into a new and diverse thing like the different locales for different group of people and also the languages that divide it. However, all these different aspects have been mingled together to form this wonderful novel. The country as a whole and the country in divided into

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fragments has been shown by him in order to show the problems that we are facing despite of being one of the largest countries in the world.

Some of the images have been presented by the novelist as he shows Saleem's loss of hair, the mutilation of his finger, and his physical appearance that is like of an old man, a buddha, as symbols of the nation being fragmented and transformed into something that is broken or crumbled. He is the symbol of India itself has just like his body the nation has also been robbed away by its beauty and the richness that it once possessed.

However, it would be incomplete if we do not mention the aspect of hybridity in this novel. This novel is full of this element and Rushdie would be really proud as he has used this element in this novel purposely.
